

"Where did my family come from?" can be a difficult question for anyone doing family research. Records can be scattered and difficult to find, if they exist at all. But often we forget that our ancestors moved not only **to** America, but **within** America. This month we look at resources to help trace ancestors as they moved within the country. Investigating patterns for why and how people moved can often to locate that "missing" link.

#### This Month's Genealogy Term: Infant

We now think of this as a baby, but as a legal term under common law, infancy can mean from birth until adulthood. Older newspapers often used it to describe children under the age of majority, typically 21. Civil code doesn't refer to infants at all, but rather to minors and adults. In that case, the division between adults and minors depends on the state and can vary widely.

▶ <u>27 Key Facts to Extract from a Death Certificate</u> Not all death certificates will contain as much information as the one the author uses as an example, but this is a good review of the need to scour your sources for every bit of information.

#### Did You Know?

- ▶ **Surnames**, otherwise known as Last names, did not come into use until around the 11th Century in Europe. There are four general groups of surnames:
  - those based on occupation (like Baker or Weaver),
  - those based on place names or geographical features (such as Goodland or Hill),
  - names coming from nicknames or appearance (like Brown or Little), and
- those that are patronymic, meaning based upon the father's name (such as McAndrew, meaning "son of Andrew" or my last name, Perkins, which means "son of Peter" or "kin of Peter").

Ellis Island didn't change the names of immigrants coming into the United States. If your surname was changed from its original spelling, it was your ancestor who shortened it, dropped a few letters, translated it into English, or maybe even unintentionally misspelled it once they came to America.
