

# Reinforcing Your Research Researching Your Female Ancestors

It can be difficult to find evidence of female ancestors, especially the further back one goes. Women's identities were usually subsumed into their husbands; often being known not as Jane Smith, but Mrs. Charles J. Smith. If you're fortunate, maiden names might be found in an obituary, but that's often not the case, especially if the woman remarried. This month's research topic provides some suggestions and strategies to help you find those elusive ladies who were such a part of our heritage.

### **Genealogy Terms**

Not really a term, but remember that women often lost their own identity when they married. Don't forget to search for them (especially in newspapers) by their husband's titles - Mrs. John Smith, Mrs. Charles J. Smith, Mrs. Smith. Sometimes, but not always, a widow will be identified by her first name, Mrs. Lucy Smith, and a divorced women by her maiden and married name: Mrs.Mary Cole Smith. No wonder we women aren't always easy to find!
