Special Opportunities

▶ Many companies are offering special opportunities to continue your research while we are all safe at home.

Archive.org has created the National Emergency Library. Users are now able to borrow electronic books without any waitlist. Access will be available through June 30th or the end of the national emergency, whichever is later. This library brings together all the books from Phillips Academy Andover and Marygrove College, and much of Trent University's collections, along with over a million other books donated from other libraries to readers worldwide that are locked out of their libraries.

<u>Sno-Isle</u> and other libraries, in partnership with ProQuest and Ancestry, have made the Ancestry Library Edition open to those working from home. If you do not have a Sno-Isle, <u>King County</u>, or other local library card most libraries are supplying e-cards which allow you to check out ebooks, magazine, videos, and do research without going into a physical library location.

Remembering History

As we navigate our new normal amid COVID-19 it is interesting to see how our ancestors, amidst WWI, coped with the Spanish Flu pandemic.

During this pandemic we have a host of technology to keep us entertained. Genealogy Charts and Forms

Genealogy charts and forms abound. The real problem is finding ones that work *with* you, providing you with a useful, efficient and robust picture of your research. It can take a lot of trial and error to find the collection that works best you. This month's research topic presents a variety of charts, forms and tools that you might find valuable.

Genealogy Terms and Procedures

When gathering details and noting information the documentation is the key. Not only does this help you follow your own path (where did you get great-great grandmother's immigration date), but it helps other corroborate your findings. Consistency in citing your sources, noting city/state/county/country, documenting maiden names, or nicknames are all important parts to save you time and help genealogists who may follow.
