

Genealogy Research Tools

1950 Census

The 1950 Census is due to be released on April 1, 2022, and many of us genealogists can't wait!

In the United States, census records are made public 72 years after they are taken. Each census gathers similar, yet slightly different information. For the 1950 census the enumerated include the continental United States, Alaska, Hawaii, American Samoa, the Canal Zone, Guam, Puerto Rico, the US Virgin Islands, and some smaller island territories. 1950 also marks the first time that United States citizens abroad were included in the enumeration. This would include service members and family members living abroad.

The 1950 Census also included some supplementary questions that could provide some unique perspectives into the lives of your ancestors, if they were lucky enough to be asked the questions. On each census page, six people would be eligible to receive the supplemental questions. These supplemental questions could reveal the birthplaces of both parents and the highest grade of school attended. For those 14 and older, you may get an idea of the family's finances, including how much money that person earned in 1949 and how much money they and other members of the household each received from interest, dividends, veterans' allowances, pensions, rents, or other income.

With the <u>increased longevity</u> of people in the US there is a good chance that researchers will be able to find living people to whom they are related, or even themselves, on this census. Another exciting development with the 1950 Census is that it will be released as a digitized document. Using the Amazon Web Services (AWS) platform the 1950 Census will be searchable using their Artificial Intelligence and Optical Character Recognition Textract tool, however with this technology comes some possibility for errors in translating the 1950's handwriting found on the records. To help address any of these errors, the National Archives is asking for volunteers to help with a <u>transcription project</u> aiming to increase the accuracy of the records.

Due to possible translation errors you'll also want to know the enumeration district for your ancestor. Stephen P Morse's site is a wonderful resource for finding the enumeration district of your ancestor. With as little as the State and County information you will be able to find the district in which your ancestor was living. Once you have the enumeration district you're ready to start good, old-fashion sleuthing to find them on the census.

One thing to remember with the 1950 Census is that college students will be enumerated

One thing to remember with the 1950 Census is that college students will be enumerated where they are attending school versus with their families. So if that college student is out of state you'll need to determine where they are located to find them on the census. Once you find them, or more likely a youth in High School, you can check out the over 450,000 yearbooks on Ancestry and download of photo of your 1950's ancestor (or yourself). A subscription to Ancestry is required or you can stop by your local public library and use their computer. It's always fun to put some personality into the names in your research.

So, no matter if you know where all your ancestors where in 1950, if you are hoping to break down some walls, if you want to find yourself, or if this is your first foray into the census world, the 1950 Census promises to be an enjoyable and data rich resource.

*Fun fact - the 1950 census was taken 1 year before the first color television program was broadcast. Something to think about as you watch the linked videos on your computer or tablet.
